Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes

s with many other events, COVID-19 affected the annual Down and Connor Lourdes Pilgrimage. When I read about the pilgrimage in the weekly bulletin, I decided to go back to Lourdes. My sister-in-law, Finola,

accompanied me. On 11th July 2023 we set out from Belfast International Airport. We arrived in Lourdes, just in time for our evening meal in the Jeanne D'Arc Hotel. We were then allocated rooms and given a programme of all organised events for the following five days. The programme listed all events – a daily Mass, Blessing of the Sick, Stations of the Cross, Sacrament of Reconciliation, Universal Mass in the underground basilica and the Torchlight Procession.

All pilgrims contributed towards a candle which was left burning at Lourdes for all our intentions. There was a special Mass celebrated in the grotto by our Apostolic Administrator, Bishop Donal McKeown, concelebrated by priests from the diocese and accompanied by the diocesan choir.

The Down and Connor youth were there to help the disabled pilgrims. There were two

choices for the Stations of the Cross – the 'low' stations, were on level ground on the banks of the River Gave and the 'high' stations were on the mountainside. These stations are depicted by life-sized bronze statues all the way to the top of the mountain. The terrain was very rough, but fortunately it didn't rain. The Stations were led by Father O'Laverty, accompanied by Bishop Donal McKeown. Going down the mountain was very steep and,

as I was flagging, Bishop Donal McKeown came to my rescue.

Bishop Donal McKeown and Father O'Laverty joined Finola and myself for a cooling drink of orange juice. We had a lot to talk about as Bishop Donal and I both came from Randalstown. His mother taught me in Moneynick Primary School, many years ago.

Finola and I spent a lot of time at the grotto where we left our petitions, lit candles for our families and friends. The 'Baths' in Lourdes have changed since COVID-19. Instead of

being immersed in cold water, we entered a small cubicle where an assistant explained the new procedure. First, we made the sign of the Cross and silently prayed, then we 'cupped' our hands and she poured water which we used to wash our faces, then more water to wash our hands and finally more water which we drank as requested by Mary to

After the final Torchlight Procession of our pilgrimage, all pilgrims, able and disabled, filled the square in front of the Basilica for a concert. The guest artist was Andrea Bocelli accompanied by a violinist. He was given a rapturous reception when he appeared on the steps of the Basilica accompanied by his young granddaughter. He sang many hymns to Our Lady. A very moving experience!

The following morning, after breakfast and Mass, we left Lourdes for our return flight. We both enjoyed Lourdes and hope to return in 2024.

From Islandmagee to Ukraine

e are David and Ruth Greer from Islandmagee. Our desire to help those directly affected by the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 started when I discovered that Russia had destroyed a large part of the Ukrainian satellite internet and phone infrastructure used by

many of the government social departments and a great number of charities based in the remote areas of the country. This was technology I had worked with for 30+ years; and, finding myself with a lot of spare equipment in fully working condition, I

immediately thought it would be of use to the charities carrying out humanitarian work in Ukraine. Getting it to where it was needed most would be a challenge, however. Many phone calls later and a lot of prayer support from our church in Woodlands, Carrickfergus, we came to the conclusion that we needed to go to Ukraine, ourselves, with the communications kit and as much humanitarian aid we could muster. We had no van but, through the power of prayer, a large van was donated to us for our journey. We were able to take not only the communication equipment but dry foods, baby supplies,



winter clothing and boxes of much-needed medical supplies, as well: all freely donated to us by the kind people of Northern Ireland.

We also started a 'Go Fund Me' appeal to help with the expenses involved and we were totally amazed at the support we received (and still do) for this work. Our journey via Dublin, France, Germany, Poland & Slovakia took five days: approximately 2,000 driving miles across Europe.

From a safety and security perspective, it was decided that Ruth would not proceed to the frontline but would stop in Krakow where she found work with a local volunteer group supplying aid to Ukrainian women and children fleeing their homes. Ruth was able to organise and deliver much-needed food items, medication, baby food and bottled drinking water to the refugees. I proceeded onward to the frontlines.

The aid I had on board the van was taken by a local Ukrainian charity focused on locating missing persons—especially children—and it was given to local aid stations on the route from eastern Ukraine to safer areas close to bordering countries.

I had pre-arranged to meet with two Ukrainian volunteers and to spend time training them in the distribution, installation and commissioning of the satellite equipment. The training took place in the carpark of a small cafe on the border. In total, I had 9 systems with me (plus spares); three were installed immediately and the remaining systems taken to eastern Ukraine to assist in the tracking of missing persons and families.



Eighteen months later, we remain in contact with these charity groups and continue to learn about their ongoing work and the successes they are achieving.



Since our first trip in March 2022 we have made a further two trips with a 4th currently being planned, as we write. The last two trips have been focused mainly on providing medical supplies such as medical hardware, hospital consumables, wheelchairs, crutches, water filtration systems, water purification tablets, cooking stoves, clinical ultra scan units, morphine pumps, theatre air pumps, manual oxygen bags, bandages, dressings and tourniquets: these are a few of the many items donated and delivered personally to the Ukrainian charities.

On our second trip we drove a large cargo van full of aid. When we had completed our deliveries to four local hospitals and an army field hospital we donated the van to an army Chaplin group who put it to use delivering much-needed aid to local villages as well as taxiing villagers to and from medical appointments.

On our third trip (summer 2023) we took an ex-NHS ambulance to transport medical supplies and non-perishable foods. Once again when we were finished with the ambulance it was donated to a civilian volunteer group for the transfer of civilian casualties from the frontline villages to safer medical facilities.

Can I say in closing that for Ruth and myself it has been a challenge at times carrying out this work but a challenge that we could not have completed without the support of everyone who has helped in whatever way. Our sincere thanks and gratitude to everyone. God Bless.

Twenty Years Service

he Bethany Bereavement Support Group is a parish-based ministry which aims to help those bereaved and grieving.

Our Bethany Group evolved from our Parish Bereavement Group which was established twenty years ago in August 2003.

Following a ten-week Bethany training course in 2013, five parishioners were commissioned by Bishop Farquhar on 1st June that year. The group is now known as Carrickfergus and Whitehead Parish Bethany Bereavement Support Group.

The name Bethany recalls the visit of Jesus to Mary and Martha on the death of their brother, Lazarus. In today's world people tend to be unaware of grief associated with bereavement. It is not widely understood that the grieving process may be long and severe. Understanding the stages of grief can be helpful and reassuring.

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Although grieving is a natural process which can be helped by the sympathy and understanding of friends, sometimes some of us need support to work through our grief in a positive way. Friends don't always know how to help; they may feel embarrassed by our grief; they may even avoid meeting us in a mistaken belief that a meeting may increase distress. It is quite normal to feel anger, guilt, fear and depression as well as the awful pain of loss. These feelings need to be expressed rather than repressed, to be talked out, cried over and put in some sort of perspective. It helps the healing process to talk with a trained listener and to confront the very strong feelings associated with grief.

All the members of our group have been bereaved. We meet together every six weeks on a Wednesday morning for prayer, planning and

review. We are trained to listen with understanding. We accept those suffering loss as they are, and offer support through the grieving process. Approximately six weeks after the death of a parishioner two members of the Bethany Group visit the home of the bereaved. If requested by the bereaved, further visits can be arranged.

In December each year we come together as a Parish Family to celebrate the Mass for the Bereaved. This Eucharist is dedicated to all those who have died in our Parish during the year and for the intentions of all the bereaved.

t started with a routine phone call between Mary Boylan and her uncle, Father Martin Cushnan in India, ending with Mary stating, "We will come for you", and Father Martin replying that he always knew she would.

Three weeks later after days of preparation, visa applications, vaccinations and making travel arrangements, Mary Boylan along with Mary Kennedy and myself were finally at Belfast International Airport about to embark on a journey that would have a profound impact on all our lives. It was 15th September and the red eye flight from Belfast to Heathrow, an eleven-hour BA flight to the Indian city of Hyderabad followed



by an internal Air India flight to Vijayawada where three weary travellers met Father. Martin and Raviteja Mukkamala. It was to be another two-hour road trip, which scarred



us for life, that finally ended at the Redemptorist Church and accommodation in Tenali.

The next morning, we attended the 8.30 am Sunday Mass. The Mass was concelebrated by Father Martin assisted by his Indian colleagues Father Vincent, Father Sleeva, Father Vejay and Father David. It was a spectacular occasion. Hundreds of people crowded into the beautifully decorated and colourful church with hundreds more gathering in the grounds listening to the service through the outdoor speaker system.



As Father Martin walked slowly up the aisle of the church, the congregation showered him with marigold petals that created a deep colourful pathway to the altar. The service lasted over two hours, but such was the colour, music and outward joy of the people we were indeed sorry when it ended.



One of the lasting impressions was the large number of young people who were in attendance and how the celebration of the Mass was enhanced through their singing, reading and general youthful enthusiasm. That evening we were privileged to be invited to a youth service led by Father Sleeva and Father Martin. Again, it was the unbridled enthusiasm, joy and love of their faith that had no boundaries for this large gathering as they sang, prayed and enjoyed a buffet style meal of local delicacies.

Every day not only opened our eyes but our hearts to the

happiness of the Catholic faith shown by these people and the love, gratitude and reverence they bestowed upon Father Martin. He was stopped in the street by not only Christian people but also by Hindu and Muslim who asked for his blessing.

We attended the celebration of Mass with Father Martin in three of the outlying villages and the respect shown to him and for the faith he had introduced them to was boundless. Everywhere we went Martin was showered with flowers and draped in silk scarves. This continued in convents, schools and in people's homes.

On our final afternoon, after five unforgettable days, we returned to Hyderabad where a surprise awaited Father Martin. In the Redemptorist house we were greeted by the first seven boys, and their families, who were taken off the streets and came under the care and protection of Martin in the 1960s. Martin wasn't just father in the pastoral or religious sense he was indeed a father, sometimes translated fondly as daddy, not only to these seven but to the hundreds, indeed thousands who came after them.

On 22nd September it was with mixed feelings that Mary Kennedy, Mary Boylan, Father Martin, and I boarded a BA flight going back to Heathrow and eventually Belfast. Spiritually we wanted to stay with the new friendships we had made in that rich tapestry of enthusiastic, happy Catholic faith where we could become part of a loving, caring and non-judgemental faith community but we had to return to our reality.

It should always be remembered that the lifework of Father Martin Cushnan started here in our parish and was supported by the generosity of the parishioners of Carrickfergus and Whitehead. The legacy of Father Martin still continues in schools, hospitals and facilities he has created under the supervision of one of his boys, Father Eddie, the Redemptorist Provincial for India. Children's Liturgy of the Word: Whitehead


