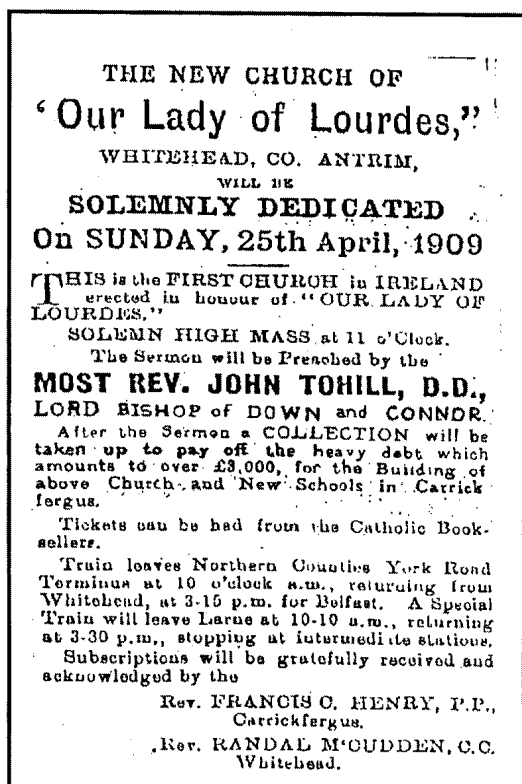
1.2 Parish Vision and Mission Statement

OUR PARISH VISION STATEMENT

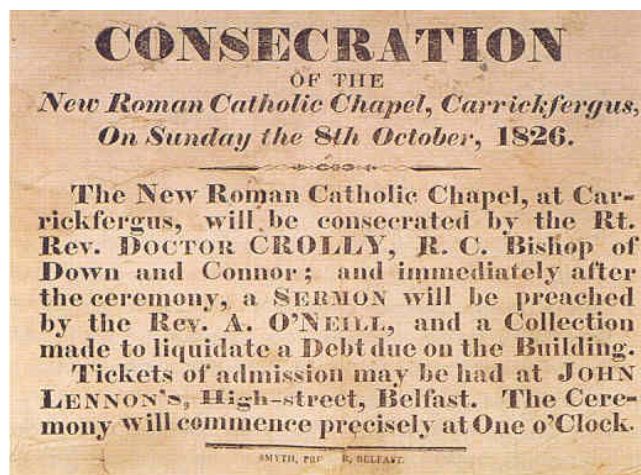

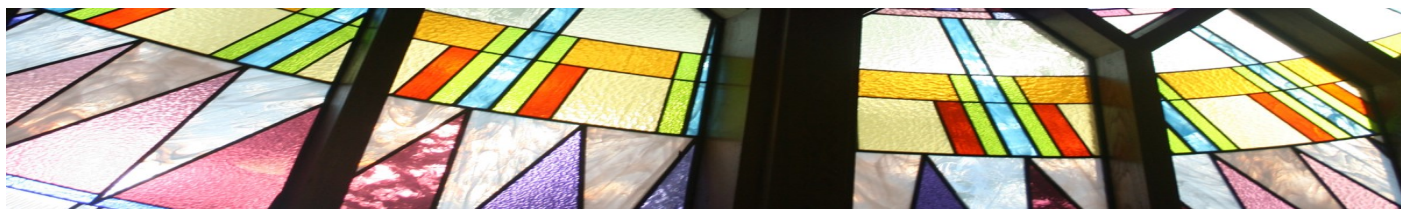

2.7 ***Rite of Christian Initiation for adults***

Thinking of becoming a Catholic? Most Catholics enter the Church through Baptism as infants and receive the Eucharist and Reconciliation (First Holy Communion and Confession) and Confirmation when young. However, there are many people who become Catholics later in life.

They decide for different reasons:

- **Some are already Christians from other traditions attracted by the teaching of the Catholic Church**
- **Some are non-Catholics who have been coming to Mass with their spouses and children and now want to become full members of the Church.**
- **Some have had no previous contact with the Church but have received an inner calling.**

2.8 ***First Confession, First Holy Communion and Confirmation***

In St Nicholas' Primary School, children receive religious education concerning the Sacraments. However, running alongside this, there is Sacramental preparation in the Parish involving both parents and children. This Sacramental preparation is vital in helping parents to recognise and assume their responsibility with regard to handing on the Catholic faith to their children.

2.9 ***Children of the Parish attending other schools***

Parents are the first teachers of their children. St Nicholas' Primary School will support parents of the Parish in this task. Those who choose to send their children to other schools are at the same time accepting full responsibility for the religious upbringing of their children. This is their right and privilege. The Parish will make sure that, with the parents' co-operation, these children will be adequately prepared for the reception of the Sacraments.

2.10 ***Altar Servers***

The Servers perform an important part in the worthy and dignified celebration of the Liturgy. Any parent of a boy or girl (aged 8+) wishing to become a Server should contact Fr. Owens.

2.11 ***Penitential Services***

Parish Penitential Services are arranged during Advent and Lent. Penitential Services are also arranged for the children preparing for the Sacraments of Penance, Eucharist and Confirmation.

2.12 Sacrament of Marriage

A minimum of three months notice is required and arrangements are by mutual agreement between the Parish and the couple.

This is to enable marriage preparation to take place and prenuptial documentation to be completed. Do not confirm wedding arrangements until you are sure the Priest and Church are available on the date and time you desire.

Couples are expected to attend a pre-marriage course. The Priest will advise when such is available and also what documentation is needed before the wedding may take place.

Should you wish to enquire further; please contact Fr. Owens.

Points to remember

- *The two documents that the couple need from the Marriage Register are:-*
- *Certificate of Notification*
- *The Marriage Schedule*
- *It is very important that all paper work for marriages, both that relating to the church requirements and that relating to civil requirements, should be completed in good time. The Church does not have the authority to waive civil procedures.*
- *In addition to all of the above, the usual procedures in Church Law must be followed.*
- *These can be explained by the Priest.*



2.13 Care of the Sick

A Parishioner who is seriously ill may receive the Sacrament of the Sick. If the person is in hospital, they should ask the nurse in charge to contact the Chaplain.

If the person is at home, or living in a nursing home within the Parish of Carrickfergus and Whitehead, they should contact Fr. Owens.

Fr. Owens attends sick and housebound monthly as announced in the Parish Bulletin, or on request.

Each year a Mass for the sick is celebrated in the Parish.

During the Mass the Sacrament of the Sick is administered.

2.14 Funerals

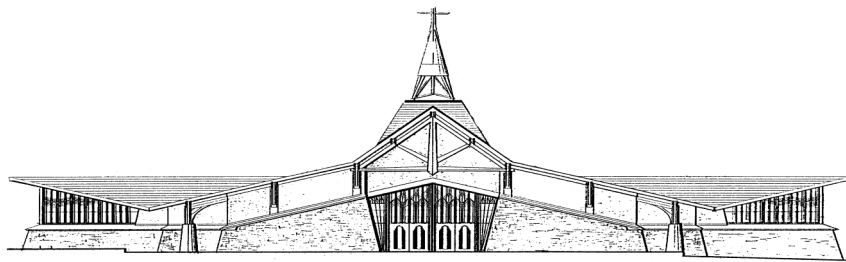

3.4 Parish Bulletin Notices

Please ensure that any notices for inclusion in the weekly Parish Bulletin arrive in the Parish Office by 12.00 noon on the Wednesday prior to the Sunday of publication. Not all notices submitted can be included due to the limited space available.

Priority is given to Parish notices. Advertisements are not normally published. The weekly Parish Bulletin keeps Parishioners informed about events in the Parish, our neighbouring Pastoral Area and the Diocese.

3.5 Certificates

Baptism, Confirmation and Marriage certificates may be ordered by telephone, email or by calling personally to the Parish Office.

4.0 Parish finances

4.1 Parish Offertory Promise Envelopes

The Parish Offertory Promise Envelopes are distributed at the beginning of March each year. A parishioner, not currently receiving a box, but who wishes to do so should contact the Parish Office.

The Maintenance Collection taken up twice a month is vital for the general upkeep of the Parish and to help reduce Parish debt.

The white weekly collection envelopes are used solely for this purpose.

The yellow voluntary collection envelope at Easter, September and Christmas and the pink 'monthly offering' envelopes are the only contributions which go toward the income of our Priests.

Special collection envelopes

There are nine blue envelopes or 'Special Collections' taken up during the year. They are as follows:-

1 Education of Diocesan Students

This collection helps fund the formation of students studying for the Priesthood in the Diocese of Down and Connor.

2 Peter's Pence (Pope's collection)

The proceeds are collected globally and given by the Church to the Pope for charitable purposes throughout the world, e.g. natural disasters such as earthquakes, famines etc.

3 Diocesan Pastoral Services

This collection supports Diocesan departments such as the Living Church and the Safeguarding Office.

4 Diocesan Cathedral

Used for the upkeep of the Diocesan Cathedral.

5 Propagation of the Faith

To help with the promotion of missionary activity throughout the world, especially in the developing world.

6 Bishop's Commissions

This collection is to assist in financing the many Commissions set up by the Irish Bishops, e.g. Justice Commission, The Family Life Commission, Ecumenism, Communications etc.

7 Diocesan Youth Commission

For Youth programmes in the Diocese of Down and Connor.

8 Sick and Retired Priests

For all the priests of the Diocese who, because of sickness or age, are no longer in active pastoral ministry.

9 Needy Parishes

This collection was set up in order that the wealthier Parishes in the Diocese could assist those Parishes in greater need.

4.2 Gift Aid

Parishioners who pay UK income tax or capital gains tax can increase the value of their weekly contribution to the Parish simply by having a Gift Aid Agreement with the Parish. This allows the Parish to claim back from HM Revenue & Customs the tax already paid on the income source. However, contributions must be paid by collection envelope, standing order or cheque. Cash put on the collection plate cannot be included. The Gift Aid scheme is simple to operate and can be done without inconvenience to Parishioners. For this reason tax paying Parishioners are encouraged to use the scheme.

Please contact the Parish office or Parish Priest for information. Gift Aid declaration forms are always available at the back of both our Churches.

4.3 Standing Order contributions

Instead of using the Offertory Promise envelopes to support the Parish, a standing order can be set up instead. Anyone interested in using this form of contribution should contact the Parish Office.

5.0 Management Committees

5.1 Carrickfergus and Whitehead

Parish Pastoral Council (PPC)

The Second Vatican council proposed the establishment of more consultative Church structures. In time this led to the creation of Parish Pastoral Councils.

Carrickfergus and Whitehead Parish Pastoral Council shares responsibility with the Parish Priest for the development and living out of our baptismal faith. We aim to ensure that every individual and group in the Parish feels welcome and rooted in Parish life. We believe that when we share our giftedness the Holy Spirit builds the Kingdom of God among us.

But what does the Parish Pastoral Council do?

Vision is knowing who we are, where we are going, and what will guide our journey. "Who we are" is our **purpose (mission.)**

The primary task of the Pastoral Council is to help the Parish identify and define its mission, at this time, within the overall mission of the Church. In this way it gives the Parish a real sense of purpose and a vision to work towards.

In order to help bring to fulfilment, this mission for our Parish, the PPC have prepared a 3 year Pastoral Plan organised into 5 distinct themes:-

- Open, Welcoming Community
- Faith and Worship
- Our Parish Priest and Lay Ministries
- Lay Participation
- Passing on the Faith

On Sunday 17th September 2017 Bishop Noel Treanor enthusiastically approved and publicly launched our first Pastoral Plan with Father Owens while celebrating the morning Masses in Carrickfergus and Whitehead. Copies were given to Parishioners afterwards.

5.2 Carrickfergus and Whitehead Parish Finance Committee

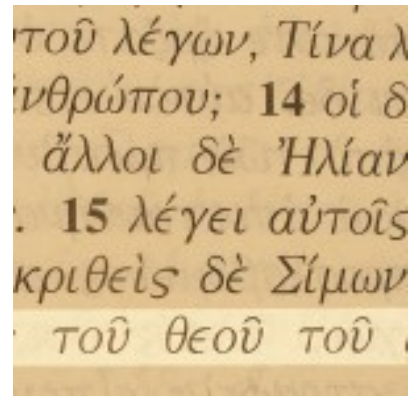

Introduction

In order to co-ordinate Liturgical Celebrations throughout the year there are two groups who meet to plan these.

The first group is concerned with the annual Liturgical Calendar. They meet twice yearly to organise and plan the timetable.

The second group is a standing committee representing all those involved with directing Liturgical Ministry and provision of Liturgical Celebrations. It meets regularly throughout the year to organise Liturgical Celebrations and reflect on how we can enhance our liturgical experience.

6.1 Parish Liturgy Group

The Parish Liturgy Group came into existence in the Spring of 2018 .

Our primary aim is to enhance the Liturgy in both churches in our Parish. We co-ordinate, promote and prepare events and services which we hope will help to nourish the spiritual lives of our parishioners.

Ideas and suggestions for the various liturgies and programmes come from within our own group and the Parish Pastoral Council. Some of the liturgies are also suitable for a wider take-up throughout our Pastoral Area. The annual Lenten and Advent services are examples of times of the year where the Liturgy Group can focus on specific, relevant, topics for promotion to our parish community. We have also had sessions on Lectio Divina and are heavily involved in the preparations for the Easter Triduum each year.

The Word of God

6.2 *Ministers of the Word*

Proclaiming the Word of God is a ministry which is very ancient. St Luke tells us that Jesus himself read the Word of God in the synagogue in Nazareth:

“He went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day as he usually did. He stood up to read and they handed him a scroll of the prophet Isaiah.” (Luke 4:16)

The Word proclaimed is the “Word of God”. The reader speaks God’s Word. The great dignity of proclamation, compared to mere reading and which makes the reading of Scripture in Church special, is that God is speaking to His people. Therefore, prayerful preparation before speaking God’s Word enables the reader to first take the Word to his or her heart. Only then can the Word be proclaimed with faith and conviction to the gathered people of God. The person who volunteers for a time to be a reader provides a life giving service to the community.

6.3 Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

The primary function of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion is to assist with the distribution of Holy Communion either at Mass or to the sick and housebound who are unable to attend Mass.

Those who undertake this service are to be always aware of their significant office. They are to be, by their exercise of this ministry, an example to others of the reverence due to the Holy Eucharist. Just as they distribute the Eucharist in the Church so are they to distribute the love of Christ in the community.

The Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, by arrangement with the Parish Priest and with due regard to Parish Safeguarding procedures, bring Holy Communion to the housebound and sick of the Parish. They are only free to do so within the Parish.

As with Ministers of the Word, as required, the Parish seeks new volunteers as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and provides the necessary training.

6.4 Sacristans

A Sacristan is a Parishioner appointed by the Parish Priest, to take care of the Sacristy and its contents.

In ancient times, many duties of the Sacristan were performed by the doorkeepers and later by the treasurers. The Sacristan's duty was to care for the sacred vessels, vestments, lights, etc.

The Sacristan's primary duties are to prepare the Church and altar for all ceremonies from the daily Mass to weddings and funerals.

They work with all involved in the planning and preparation of special ceremonies to facilitate the running of the occasion.

6.5 Children's Liturgy Group

The Children's Liturgy Group meet in the Church each Sunday during Masses at Carrickfergus and Whitehead.

Primary School aged children of the Parish are invited to attend following the opening prayers of the Mass to listen to and discuss the Gospel of the day. They take part in a discussion on the Word of God and how the theme of the Gospel can relate to their own lives.

The children may also complete a worksheet activity or an art project on the theme of the day.

To conclude, a number of the children will carry up the worksheet activity as part of the Offertory Procession whilst the remaining children return to their parents for the remainder of the Mass.

They offer direct, personal assistance that is non-judgemental and based on the need of the individual or family.

9.0 Parish Cell System Of Evangelisation



Parish Cells are faith groups of 4 to 12 people who meet every two weeks in the informal setting of a home for prayer, reflection and to share their faith. The aim of a Cell group is to foster within a parish a greater sense of community spirit and an awareness of God in a more personal way. It provides a place where friendships are formed, faith is deepened and people are enabled to see the relevance of their faith in all that they do.

Pope Francis invited Cell members from around the world to an audience with him in the Vatican on 5th September 2015 to mark the decree of Papal approval.

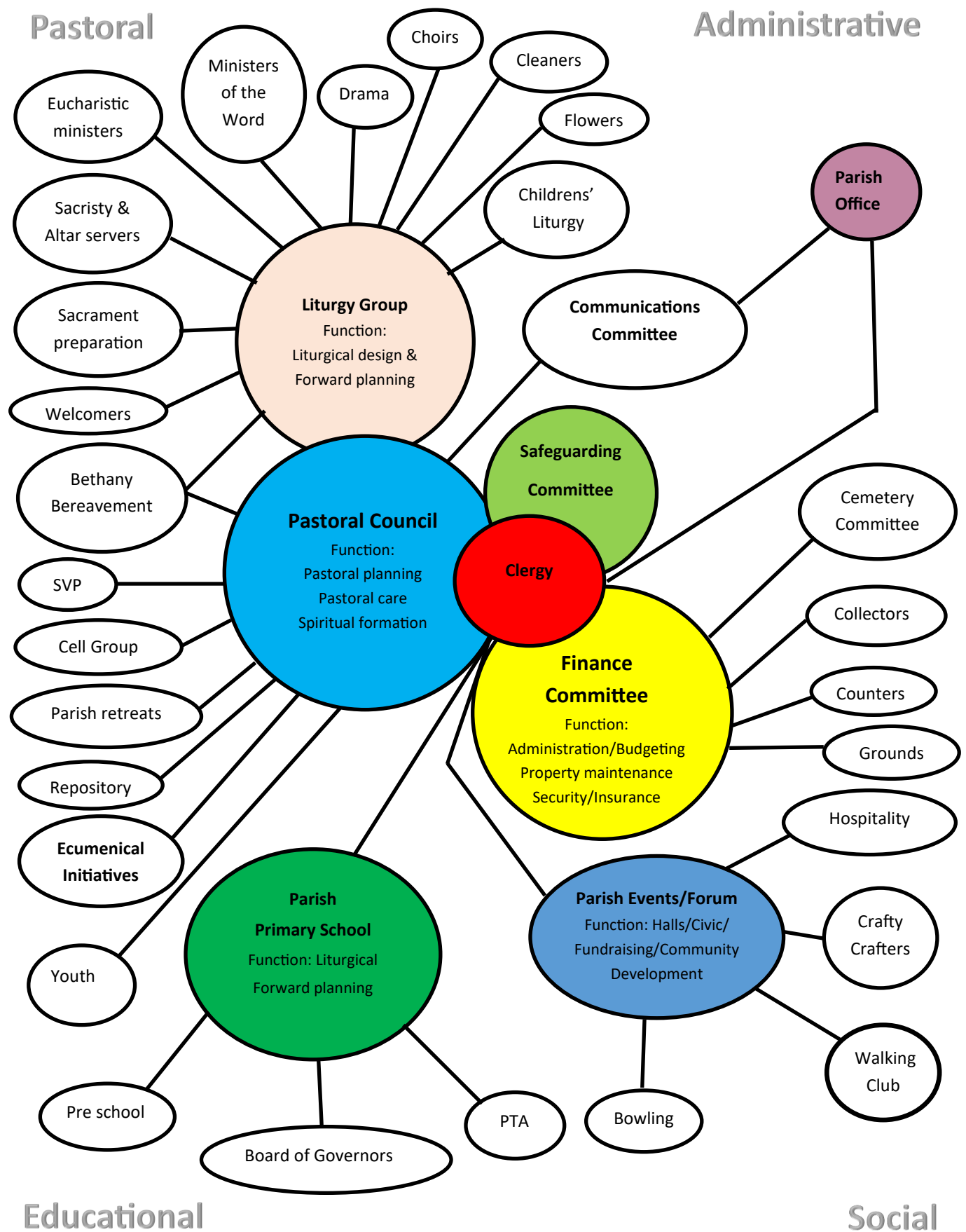
